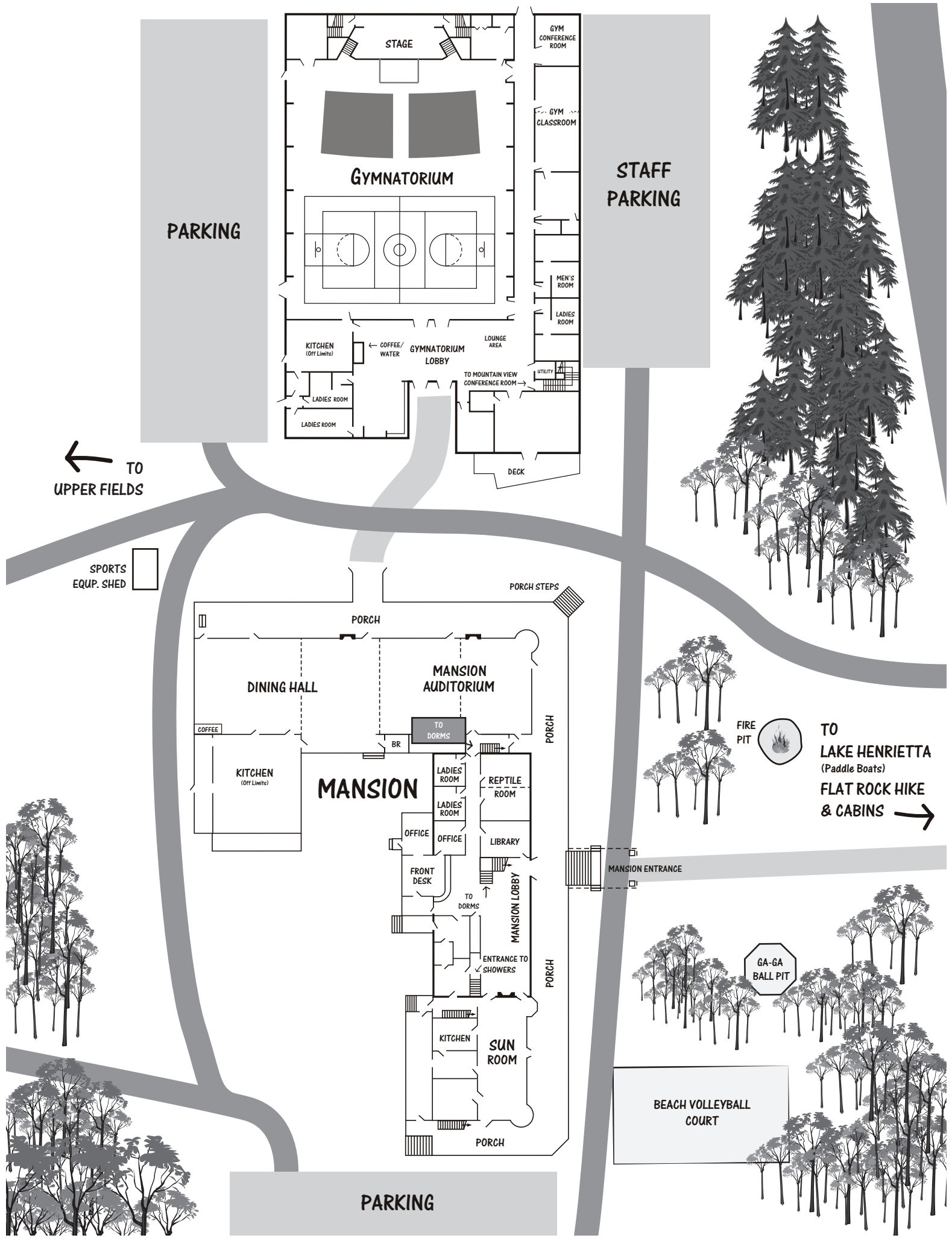

3 Core Principles of a Sent Life

A. God is always at work to draw people to Himself.

- John 5:17 – “My Father is **always at his work** to this very day, and I too am working.”
- Ecclesiastes 3:1 – [God] has also **set eternity** in the human heart.
- Luke 19:10 – “For the Son of Man came to **seek and save the lost.**”

B. God uses us to lead people to Jesus.

- Acts 1:8 – “You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and **you will be my witnesses.**”
- 2 Corinthians 2:14 –But thanks be to God, who always leads us as captives in Christ's triumphal procession and uses us to **spread the aroma of the knowledge of him.**
- 2 Corinthians 5:18-21 – God reconciled us to himself through Christ and **gave us the ministry of reconciliation:** that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. **And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us.**

C. God invites into the work of telling people about Jesus.

- Matthew 28:18-20 – Then Jesus came to them and said, “All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, **go and make disciples of all nations,** baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age.
- Matthew 4:19 – “Come follow me, and **I will make you fish for people.**”

Sent people have a rich theology of place.

Sent people become people of prayer.

- Ask for revelation (Ephesians 1:17-19).
- Ask that God turn their eyes from worthless things (Psalm 119:34-37)
- and that they come to their senses (2 Timothy 2:25-26).
- Ask God to send other to help (Matthew 9:38).
- Ask for an open door for the message of the gospel (Colossians 4:2-4).
- Ask for boldness (Ephesians 6:18-20).
- Ask that the gospel spreads quickly (2 Thessalonians 3:1).
- Ask God to instruct you in when, where, and how to communicate the gospel (Psalm 32:8)

Sent people understand their titles and job descriptions:

- Fisherman (Matthew 4:19)
- Farmer (Mark 4)
- Royal Priest (1 Peter 2:9)
- Ambassador (2 Corinthians 5)

Sent people leverage their best skills: asking great questions and telling great stories.

The 4 Best Questions:

- What does your tradition say about Jesus?
- Do you consider yourself on a spiritual journey?
- I just learned something in the Bible that’s really helping me deal with this? May I share this with you?
- I’m in a fresh season of prayer. Do you have any prayer requests?

Transitioning to Spiritual Conversations

Question	Spiritual Connection
What’s your biggest stressor lately?	I can pray for this. This also reminds me of how God brought me through something similar. . .
What are you celebrating--or what is going well for you?	I’m celebrating this answer to prayer or this way God was faithful. . .
What question do you currently like people to ask you?	I love to talk about what I’m learning in scripture. . .
What thought keeps going through your mind that you cannot get rid of?	I sometimes think of certain passages of scripture when I’m stuck. . .
How are you taking care of yourself?	I’m doing some cool morning rituals for well-being like my Bible reading and gratitude journal. . .
How are you staying motivated?	I’m thinking a lot about God giving me fresh power and ability to work.
What are you learning?	I’m learning this great thing in the Bible. . .

Consider your best stories of transformation to share with others as your best tool for living a sent life.

1. Write / tell the story of God rescuing you. (*salvation*)
2. Write / tell the story of maturing you. (*maturity*)
3. Story of God meeting you in a time of need. (*provision*)

1. What thoughts or feelings do you experience when you think of yourself as “sent?”
2. What evidence do you already see that God chose you for your present location?
3. Who did God send to help you begin or continue your relationship with Jesus?

Romans 1:9-10

⁹ For God is my witness, whom I serve with my spirit in the gospel of his Son, that without ceasing I mention you ¹⁰ always in my prayers, asking that somehow by God's will I may now at last succeed in coming to you.

Romans 15:14-33

¹⁴ I myself am satisfied about you, my brothers, that you yourselves are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge and able to instruct one another. ¹⁵ But on some points I have written to you very boldly by way of reminder, because of the grace given me by God ¹⁶ to be a minister of Christ Jesus to the Gentiles in the priestly service of the gospel of God, so that the offering of the Gentiles may be acceptable, sanctified by the Holy Spirit. ¹⁷ In Christ Jesus, then, I have reason to be proud of my work for God. ¹⁸ For I will not venture to speak of anything except what Christ has accomplished through me to bring the Gentiles to obedience—by word and deed, ¹⁹ by the power of signs and wonders, by the power of the Spirit of God—so that from Jerusalem and all the way around to Illyricum I have fulfilled the ministry of the gospel of Christ; ²⁰ and thus I make it my ambition to preach the gospel, not where Christ has already been named, lest I build on someone else's foundation, ²¹ but as it is written,

“Those who have never been told of him will see, and those who have never heard will understand.”

²² This is the reason why I have so often been hindered from coming to you. ²³ But now, since I no longer have any room for work in these regions, and since I have longed for many years to come to you, ²⁴ I hope to see you in passing as I go to Spain, and to be helped on my journey there by you, once I have enjoyed your company for a while. ²⁵ At present, however, I am going to Jerusalem bringing aid to the saints. ²⁶ For Macedonia and Achaia have been pleased to make some contribution for the poor among the saints at Jerusalem. ²⁷ For they were pleased to do it, and indeed they owe it to them. For if the Gentiles have come to share in their spiritual blessings, they ought also to be of service to them in material blessings. ²⁸ When therefore I have completed this and have delivered to them what has been collected, I will leave for Spain by way of you. ²⁹ I know that when I come to you I will come in the fullness of the blessing of Christ.

³⁰ I appeal to you, brothers, by our Lord Jesus Christ and by the love of the Spirit, to strive together with me in your prayers to God on my behalf, ³¹ that I may be delivered from the unbelievers in Judea, and that my service for Jerusalem may be acceptable to the saints, ³² so that by God's will I may come to you with joy and be refreshed in your company. ³³ May the God of peace be with you all. Amen.

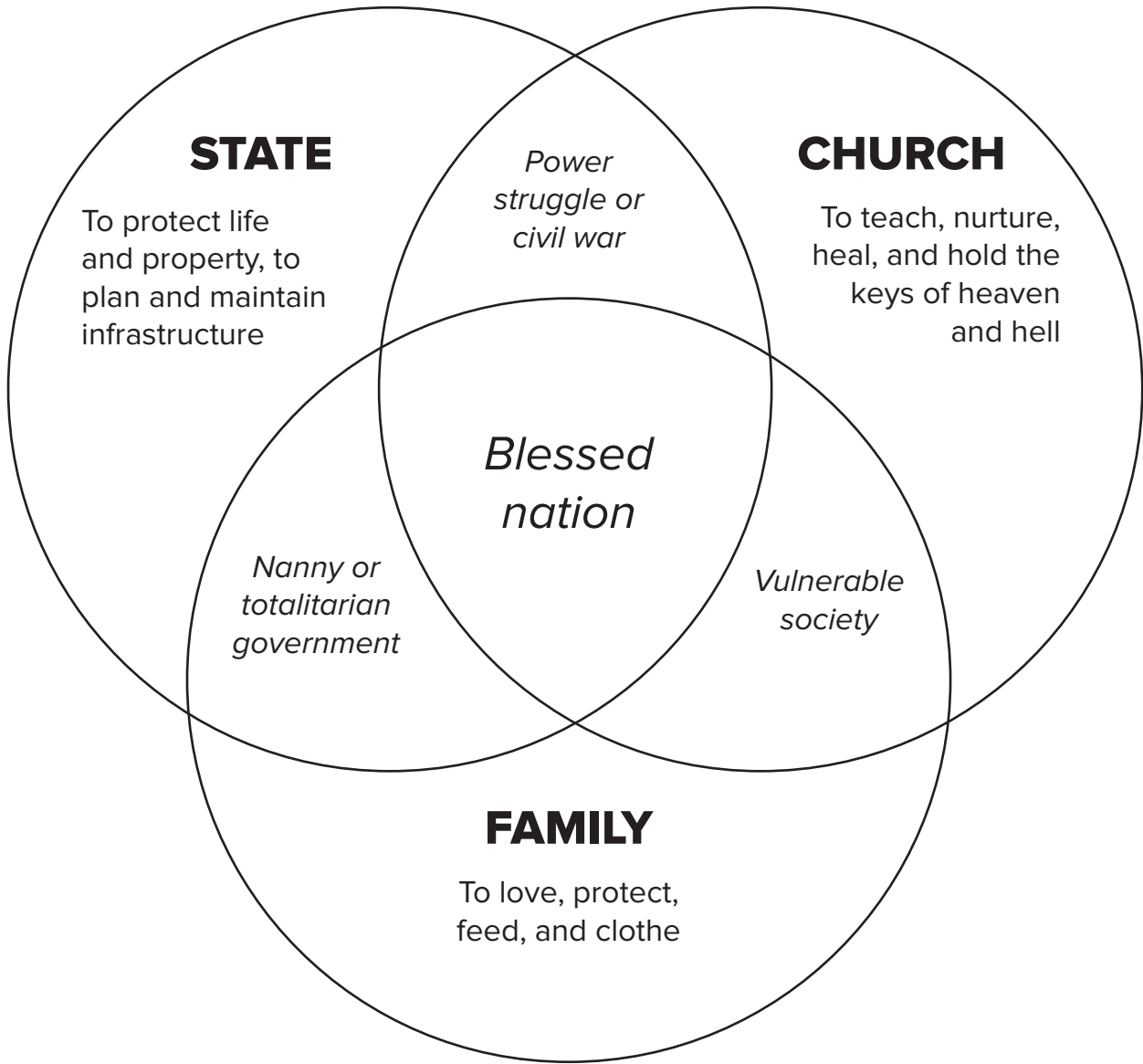

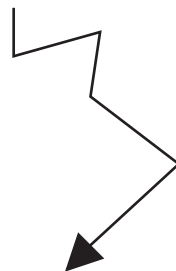
STRAIGHT LINE JUDGMENT

And they sewed fig leaves together and made themselves loincloths.

⁸ And they heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. ⁹ But the Lord God called to the man and said to

him, "Where are you?" ¹⁰ And he said, "I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked, and I hid myself." ¹¹ He said, "Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten of the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?" ¹² The man said, "The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit of the tree, and I ate." ¹³ Then the Lord God said to the woman, "What is this that you have done?" The woman said, "The serpent deceived me, and I ate."

¹⁴ The Lord God said to the serpent, "Because you have done this, cursed are you above all livestock and above all beasts of the field; on your belly you shall go, and dust you shall eat all the days of your life. ¹⁵ I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel."

¹⁶ To the woman he said, "I will surely multiply your pain in childbearing; in pain you shall bring forth children. Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, but he shall rule over you."

Here’s the plan - each day (except Friday!) read the following section from Romans ...

- Monday: Romans 12:1-8
- Tuesday: Romans 12:9-21
- Wednesday: Romans 13
- Thursday: Romans 15

As you read each chapter, think through the following questions (the text of each day’s passage is provided for you below so you can mark it up as much as you want!).

1. Are there any repeated words or images in this chapter? Any commands or promises?
2. What does this chapter teach you about God (His character, His works, etc)
3. What would you say is the main point of this chapter? Try to put it into one sentence if you can!
4. Finally, spend a few moments praying in response to your time in God’s Word. Maybe you want to thank Him for what He’s done, or ask for strength to honor Him, or simply pray that you would be open to learn & grow today.

Monday

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. ² Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

³ For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. ⁴ For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, ⁵ so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another. ⁶ Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; ⁷ if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; ⁸ the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness.

Tuesday

⁹ Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. ¹⁰ Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. ¹¹ Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. ¹² Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. ¹³ Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality.

¹⁴ Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. ¹⁵ Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. ¹⁶ Live in harmony with one another. Do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly. Never be wise in your own sight. ¹⁷ Repay no one evil for evil, but give thought to do what is honorable in the sight of all. ¹⁸ If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. ¹⁹ Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave it to the wrath of God, for it is written, “Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord.” ²⁰ To the contrary, “if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by so doing you will heap burning coals on his head.” ²¹ Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

Wednesday

Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. ² Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment. ³ For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Would you have no fear of the one who is in authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive his approval, ⁴ for he is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for he does not bear the sword in vain. For he is the servant of God, an avenger who carries out God's wrath on the wrongdoer. ⁵ Therefore one must be in subjection, not only to avoid God's wrath but also for the sake of conscience. ⁶ For because of this you also pay taxes, for the authorities are ministers of God, attending to this very thing. ⁷ Pay to all what is owed to them: taxes to whom taxes are owed, revenue to whom revenue is owed, respect to whom respect is owed, honor to whom honor is owed.

⁸ Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. ⁹ For the commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁰ Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law.

¹¹ Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed. ¹² The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light. ¹³ Let us walk properly as in the daytime, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarreling and jealousy. ¹⁴ But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Thursday

We who are strong have an obligation to bear with the failings of the weak, and not to please ourselves. ² Let each of us please his neighbor for his good, to build him up. ³ For Christ did not please himself, but as it is written, "The reproaches of those who reproached you fell on me." ⁴ For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope. ⁵ May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live in such harmony with one another, in accord with Christ Jesus, ⁶ that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁷ Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.

⁸ For I tell you that Christ became a servant to the circumcised to show God's truthfulness, in order to confirm the promises given to the patriarchs, ⁹ and in order that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written,

"Therefore I will praise you among the Gentiles,
and sing to your name."

¹⁰ And again it is said,
"Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people."

¹¹ And again,
"Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles,
and let all the peoples extol him."

¹² And again Isaiah says,
"The root of Jesse will come,
even he who arises to rule the Gentiles;
in him will the Gentiles hope."

¹³ May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope.

¹⁴ I myself am satisfied about you, my brothers, that you yourselves are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge and able to instruct one another. ¹⁵ But on some points I have written to you very boldly by way of reminder, because of the grace given me by God ¹⁶ to be a minister of Christ Jesus to the Gentiles in the priestly service of the gospel of God, so that the offering of the Gentiles may be acceptable, sanctified by the Holy Spirit. ¹⁷ In Christ Jesus, then, I have reason to be proud of my work for God. ¹⁸ For I will not venture to speak of anything except what Christ has accomplished through me to bring the Gentiles to obedience—by word and deed, ¹⁹ by the power of signs and wonders, by the power of the Spirit of God—so that from Jerusalem and all the way around to Illyricum I have fulfilled the ministry of the gospel of Christ; ²⁰ and thus I make it my ambition to preach the gospel, not where Christ has already been named, lest I build on someone else's foundation, ²¹ but as it is written,

"Those who have never been told of him will see,
and those who have never heard will understand."

²² This is the reason why I have so often been hindered from coming to you. ²³ But now, since I no longer have any room for work in these regions, and since I have longed for many years to come to you, ²⁴ I hope to see you in passing as I go to Spain, and to be helped on my journey there by you, once I have enjoyed your company for a while. ²⁵ At present, however, I am going to Jerusalem bringing aid to the saints. ²⁶ For Macedonia and Achaia have been pleased to make some contribution for the poor among the saints at Jerusalem. ²⁷ For they were pleased to do it, and indeed they owe it to them. For if the Gentiles have come to share in their spiritual blessings, they ought also to be of service to them in material blessings. ²⁸ When therefore I have completed this and have delivered to them what has been collected, I will leave for Spain by way of you. ²⁹ I know that when I come to you I will come in the fullness of the blessing of Christ.

³⁰ I appeal to you, brothers, by our Lord Jesus Christ and by the love of the Spirit, to strive together with me in your prayers to God on my behalf, ³¹ that I may be delivered from the unbelievers in Judea, and that my service for Jerusalem may be acceptable to the saints, ³² so that by God's will I may come to you with joy and be refreshed in your company. ³³ May the God of peace be with you all. Amen.

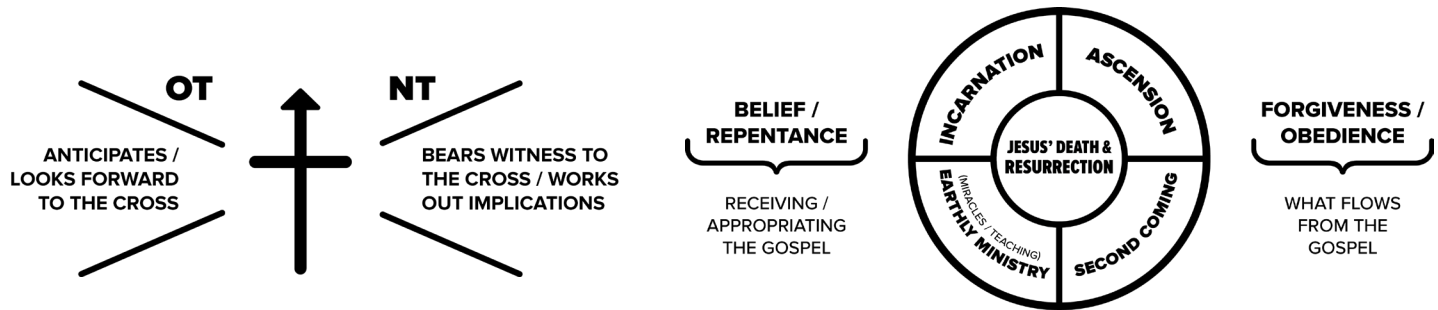

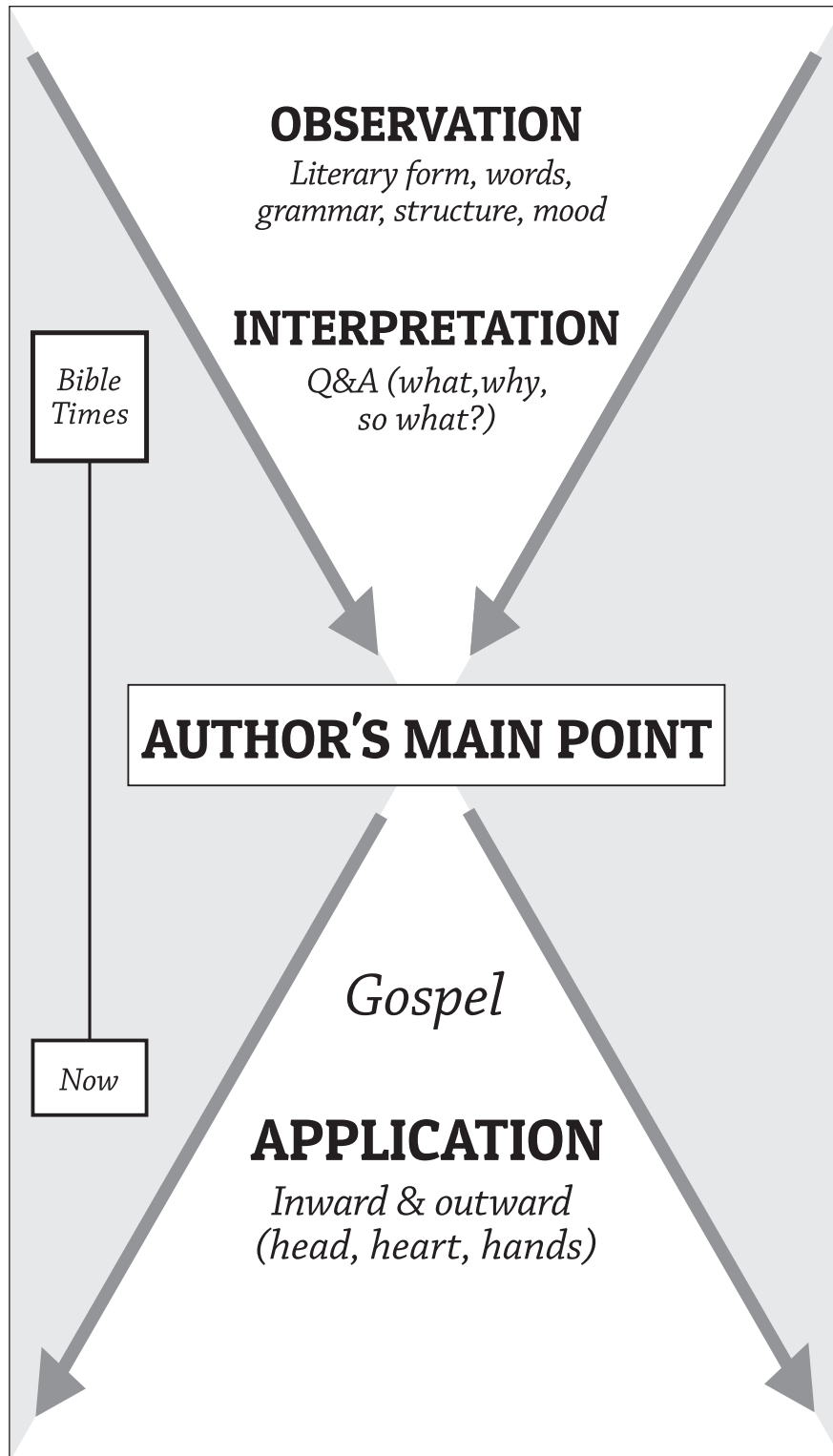

Eight Don'ts of Leading Bible Studies

1. *Don't answer your own question.* Otherwise your group will begin to look to you as “the teacher” rather than “the facilitator.” If necessary repeat or rephrase an unclear question.
2. *Don't be afraid of silence.* Silence may mean:
 - People are thinking (this is true 90% of the time)
 - People are confused and need the question restated
 - People are asleep; not a real healthy sign :-)
3. *Don't be content with just one answer.* For every written question feel free to ask two or three follow-up questions like: “What does someone else think?” This allows a number of people to respond.
4. *Don't expect group members to respond to you with each answer.* They will be tempted to do this especially when the group is new. Instead, though, you want to see them talking to each other so you don't have to “broker” the entire conversation.
5. *Don't reject an answer as wrong.* Respond to questionable answers by asking: “How did you come to that conclusion?” or: “Does anyone have another way of looking at it?” Try to be affirming whenever possible.
6. *Don't be afraid of controversy.* Of course, your group won't profit that raises more heat than light. But differences of opinion can be a stimulus for learning.
7. *Don't allow the group to get in a rut.* As long as you stay in line with the passage, the more creative you can be the merrier.
8. *Don't allow the group to end late.* If the discussion proves very fruitful, officially end the group on time with the opportunity for those who choose to stay and discuss the issue in more depth.



John 1:1-18

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God.

³ All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made. ⁴ In him was life, and the life was the light of men. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

⁶ There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him. ⁸ He was not the light, but came to bear witness about the light.

⁹ The true light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world was made through him, yet the world did not know him. ¹¹ He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. ¹² But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, ¹³ who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.

¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. ¹⁵ (John bore witness about him, and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks before me, because he was before me.'") ¹⁶ For from his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷ For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸ No one has ever seen God; the only God, who is at the Father's side, he has made him known.

**John 1:19-28**

¹⁹ And this is the testimony of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, “Who are you?” ²⁰ He confessed, and did not deny, but confessed, “I am not the Christ.” ²¹ And they asked him, “What then? Are you Elijah?” He said, “I am not.” “Are you the Prophet?” And he answered, “No.” ²² So they said to him, “Who are you? We need to give an answer to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?” ²³ He said, “I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, ‘Make straight the way of the Lord,’ as the prophet Isaiah said.”

²⁴ (Now they had been sent from the Pharisees.) ²⁵ They asked him, “Then why are you baptizing, if you are neither the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?” ²⁶ John answered them, “I baptize with water, but among you stands one you do not know, ²⁷ even he who comes after me, the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie.” ²⁸ These things took place in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

**John 1:29-42**

²⁹ The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, “Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!

³⁰ This is he of whom I said, ‘After me comes a man who ranks before me, because he was before me.’ ³¹ I myself did not know him, but for this purpose I came baptizing with water, that he might be revealed to Israel.” ³² And John bore witness: “I saw the Spirit descend from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. ³³ I myself did not know him, but he who sent me to baptize with water said to me, ‘He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.’ ³⁴ And I have seen and have borne witness that this is the Son of God.”

³⁵ The next day again John was standing with two of his disciples, ³⁶ and he looked at Jesus as he walked by and said, “Behold, the Lamb of God!” ³⁷ The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. ³⁸ Jesus turned and saw them following and said to them, “What are you seeking?” And they said to him, “Rabbi” (which means Teacher), “where are you staying?” ³⁹ He said to them, “Come and you will see.” So they came and saw where he was staying, and they stayed with him that day, for it was about the tenth hour. ⁴⁰ One of the two who heard John speak and followed Jesus was Andrew, Simon Peter’s brother. ⁴¹ He first found his own brother Simon and said to him, “We have found the Messiah” (which means Christ). ⁴² He brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him and said, “You are Simon the son of John. You shall be called Cephas” (which means Peter).

**John 1:43-51**

⁴³ The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, "Follow me." ⁴⁴ Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. ⁴⁵ Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found him of whom Moses in the Law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." ⁴⁶ Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." ⁴⁷ Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom there is no deceit!" ⁴⁸ Nathanael said to him, "How do you know me?" Jesus answered him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." ⁴⁹ Nathanael answered him, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" ⁵⁰ Jesus answered him, "Because I said to you, 'I saw you under the fig tree,' do you believe? You will see greater things than these." ⁵¹ And he said to him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending on the Son of Man."

**John 2:1-12**

¹ On the third day there was a wedding at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ² Jesus also was invited to the wedding with his disciples. ³ When the wine ran out, the mother of Jesus said to him, “They have no wine.” ⁴ And Jesus said to her, “Woman, what does this have to do with me? My hour has not yet come.” ⁵ His mother said to the servants, “Do whatever he tells you.”

⁶ Now there were six stone water jars there for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to the servants, “Fill the jars with water.” And they filled them up to the brim. ⁸ And he said to them, “Now draw some out and take it to the master of the feast.” So they took it. ⁹ When the master of the feast tasted the water now become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the master of the feast called the bridegroom ¹⁰ and said to him, “Everyone serves the good wine first, and when people have drunk freely, then the poor wine. But you have kept the good wine until now.” ¹¹ This, the first of his signs, Jesus did at Cana in Galilee, and manifested his glory. And his disciples believed in him.

¹² After this he went down to Capernaum, with his mother and his brothers and his disciples, and they stayed there for a few days.

PRAY

Begin every day with a simple, specific prayer surrendering control to Jesus as you prepare to do this good work which may be far outside your comfort zone. An example could be something like this: *"Here I am, Lord; please use me for Jesus' sake and Your purposes. Introduce me to the people you want me to love, and please help me to stay alert and look for opportunities to share Jesus. Amen."*

WEEKLY

INTAKE

Read the assigned scripture and take in the weekly resource (a blog post, article, or a talk recording). These weekly teaching will encourage and equip you to build relationships and share Christ!

INVEST

Spend casual time with a non-Christian friend or acquaintance. It could be the same person each time or 7 different people. It may even be one of the new people you meet! This is to be a casual, activity like grabbing coffee or going to play volleyball together. Record the *when, where, and what* of these activities in your GO Journal (starts next page.)

INVITE

Ask one of these non-Christian friends to a "religious" activity that you feel is appropriate. They don't have to accept; you just have to invite them! It could be church, a Bible study, a summer fellowship meeting, etc. Record this in your GO Journal.

GO GOALS

1. MEET 15 NEW PEOPLE

This can be done any way or anywhere. To put it another way, you can meet people as the Lord leads as he answers your prayers for daily opportunities.

Try to record the names of those you meet. Review and pray for them daily. This will help you remember as people, not projects.

2. ASK 4 PEOPLE ABOUT JESUS

You might start by asking about their church background and if they still go. Then move to the question of Jesus. The key is to be sensitive to the Lord's guidance. This might happen at a time you don't expect or a week when you feel unprepared.

But don't be afraid – you've been praying for moments like this! Remember your simple daily prayer? God hears and answers. You can expect Him to provide, whether through some miraculous opportunities or the daily good of obedience. You can count on wisdom from Him in the right moment as you obey. *"Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit," says the Lord.*" (Zechariah 4:6).
